David Garza Salazar Dean and Chief Executive President Tecnológico de Monterrey

We are convinced that education is one of the most important tools to face challenges, one of the most noble activities, with greater potential, and one of the most urgent, to promote greater development in our societies.

Some people regard universities as institutions that are only dedicated to preparing individuals for the workplace. We have a different and much broader vision. We prepare people for life, to face the future, not only their own, but that of society. We conceive ourselves as a space of formation, but also as a space of research and knowledge transfer. We make sure that students develop a collective conscience and that they practice their social responsibility and civic engagement in any field where they develop.

Tecnológico de Monterrey is an institution of society and for society. Throughout its history, it has been renowned for forming leaders with an entrepreneurial spirit, a sense of humanity, and competitive internationallywise, which has rendered into over 300,000 graduates, who have not only contributed to creating jobs and development, but who have also created over 30 thousand organizations in the civil society, with causes that favor the community and that devote 1.3 million volunteer-hours per month.

Undoubtedly, what we have done in our over 75 years of history has contributed to the well-being of our country, but we know that there is still much more to be done to solve pending topics.

In 2019, we presented a new stage of transformation towards the future which marks a turning point in our history. Consolidated by the accomplishments reached, today we foresee a more humane future, where we place the wellbeing of individuals at the core, and with which we can make a greater impact to contribute to social development. We conceive ourselves as a co-responsible actor of social transformation: we understand the significance of establishing and fostering significant relationships with individuals, with our environment, and with all the living beings with whom we share the planet.

Today we seek for our social efforts to add to local, national, and global agendas.

At Tecnológico de Monterrey, we are always concerned about incorporating cutting-edge technology in our educational and research projects. We can say that we are a high-tech institution, but this would be incomplete if we pushed aside the proximity with all the communities around us; thus, we are a high-tech institution with close proximity.

This report presents our starting point: the results obtained from a mapping done at the institutional level of the most representative actions carried out by our community, where that proximity and that sense of humanity which characterize us are lived everyday.

In the future, we foresee a **Tecnológico de Monterrey** committed to continue bolstering social transformation, increasingly organized, and with a greater positive and measurable impact in our community.

A Tec, who, through its community of students, alumni, faculty, directors, collaborators and allies, works with society to make it more equitable and more sustainable.

Introduction

Aware of the joint responsibility we have of generating a positive impact in our society, at Tecnológico de Monterrey we conduct a large number of actions throughout the country focused on the common good.

These are projects, activities or programmes whose aim is to generate a social transformation, or the sustainable development of individuals and their communities, of the environment, and of the actors of change themselves.

These social contributions involve different actors of the Tec community who bring forth their skills at the service of society. Each of these lines of action is made up of different arms. through which the institution intervenes positively inside and outside the classrooms:

- Academic projects with a social sense: projects that have a positive impact on society are carried out in the classroom. Additionally, our new educational model is enabling our students to connect, exponentially, with communities, through the work with associated partners to solve social challenges.
- **Research:** the different research centers which are part of the Tec are some of the most important sources of knowledge of the institution. A great part of this information favors society in different areas.
- Campus: through their operations and capacity to mobilize resources, campuses constantly generate actions of positive social and environmental impact.
- **Students:** student groups with similar interests come together to reach shared objectives of great impact for society.
- **EXATEC:** the Associations and Clubs of alumni design and carry out projects of socio-cultural transcendence in order to improve the environment and the relationship of their members.
- **Institutional:** our programs and initiatives, with national reach, promote the cooperation of the members of the Tecnológico de Monterrey at their different levels in order to boost the development of the country.
- Social Service: through a life experience that favors the ethical and civics commitment of our students, this obligation, along with the collaboration of associated partner organizations, addresses several problems that afflict the country.

Social service in 2019:

In average,19,260students per semester did social service;

6,570, during the summer.

3,294
registered projects:

437 of these promoted ethics and citizenship with the attribute Course with Transversal Citizenship (CCTR) which is granted to subjects with a social and civics feature.

2,857 were carried out with allied associated partners organizations.

- 182 teachers promoted doing social service projects with activities such as Semana i (i Week), Semestre i (i Semester), and Verano i (i Summer) with Humane Spirit.
- We worked with over partners organizations (including civil society organizations, government entities, communities, and socially responsible companies).
- 2,385,820 hours of social service completed on average per semester.

78 % of the students completed more than the 480 hours of social service, with an average of 550 hours per student.

At Tec de Monterrey we know that it is only through the collaboration of different actors of society that we will accomplish a real social transformation.

This report highlights the substantial role of collaborative work done by the Tec community with Non-governmental organizations -local, national, and international- with actors of the public sector, with hospitals, companies, institutions, universities, individuals, and other entities, all of them significant allies without whom it would be impossible to fulfill the purpose of generating a relevant positive impact.

Additionally, this document presents the results of the first mapping of social initiatives of the Tec which was carried out in the last trimester of 2019, with the registration of almost 800 of the most representative and which encompass the areas of all the institution, including its National Schools, Campuses, PrepaTec, Tecmilenio University, TecSalud, the Vice-presidencies, Vice-rectorships, the Centers and all the other areas that make up the Tec community.

Each of the initiatives was classified by Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's), as they represent a framework which progressively will guide and align our management and way of thinking. Thus, we join a global agenda of transformation, and we disclose the way in which our institution and its community are contributing to the eradication of the main world problems. Although it is common for an action to address more than one SDG, or that it benefits several sectors of the population, for the purposes of this report we only considered the main SDG's addressed.

All this has allowed us to identify vital areas of opportunity, such as the need to implement a standardized methodology of data collection, or the need to optimize measuring tools, which in the future, will ease the interpretation of results and boost the impact and social benefit achieved in the different communities of the country.

THE Impact Rankings 2020

In 2019, **Times Higher Education (THE)** published for the first time the University Impact Rankings, a list that measures, at a global level, the positive impact that universities have to the contribution of the **17 Sustainable Development Goals** of the **United Nations Organization (UN).**

Each of these SDGs is evaluated according to parameters related with their level of research, of the use of the resources, and of the impact of joint work with the community and the State.

In this second edition, 766 universities from 85 countries participated, and the 17 United Nations SDGs were evaluated. In our case, we were part of all, except for number **14 Life Below Water**, in which we have no activity. For the **world ranking**, the three best positioned SDGs are used, plus the *Partnerships for the goals*. This time we occupy a position in the rank 100-200.

All this tells us that we have done a great job, but it is also a reminder that there is still much to do.











Students from Tec de Monterrey who study the subject Applied Ethics collaborate in this initative which involves developing responsibility and social awareness in order to bring together actions that focus on the transformation of one of the most complex polygons of the zone of San Juan de Abajo in León, Guanajuato.

Work in this community started in the semester of August-December 2018, and it considers two challenges:

> 1.Implementing a four-session workshop for the residents of this zone, about empowerment, communication, leadership, and teamwork, which will help them define their personal life, work, and community projects.

> 2. Conduct opinion polls in the community, organized by the "Fundación León" (León Foundation), in order to understand the needs and problems of the region, present the results to the Community Assembly, and plan generate

Additionally to Tecnológico de Monterrey, The Ministry of Economic Development, Calzado Bambino, and Fundación León, collaborate in this initiative; these institutions have started a socio-political agenda to make the community visible and dignify its inhabitants.

Soy porque somos (I am because we are) has the potential to be replicated in other vulnerable communities which need more attention and support to favor their well-being.



Listening and developing communities

This initiative develops social immersion activities together with the educator partner **TECHO**:

- 1. Listening to communities: surveys are carried out with neighbors of the community in order to make a diagnostic about priority scarcities of elementary services, security, jobs, household conditions, and community activities.
- **2. Developing communities:** TECHO interprets the information obtained in the surveys to make emergency dwellings and implement social programs that develop competencies and abilities of continuous collaboration between the community and their volunteers.

Some workshops are also carried out for the neighbors, to favor community and self-management competences, so that individuals can lead projects that will aim at generating solutions for the problems that persist in the community.

This initiative is present in the campuses at Mexico City, State of Mexico, Santa Fe, Monterrey, Puebla, Chiapas and Guadalajara.

Projects of cultural identity

In the class of Ethics, profession and citizenship of Campus Chiapas, professor José Manuel Islas Pacheco encourages his students to do several projects in indigenous communities of Chiapas.

1. Culture and identity of handcraft products

Students generate proposals for the commercialization of handcraft products without losing their culture and identity, and being valued as cultural heritage.

Additionally, they make a diagnosis and analysis of the touristic potential at the handcraft station, as well as the collaboration with different authorities and actors of society, in order to strengthen the office of tourism in San Andrés Larráinzar, Chiapas.



2. Local markets

It focuses on creating space and interior design propositions of the local markets of Tenejapa, Chiapas, in order to promote their comercial activities.

There are four teams of students of our institution, making floor plans of the spaces mentioned, renders, an executive project to create a brand that boosts their commercialization, and walkthrough 3D.





Strategy ZERO HUNGER

In the context of the World Nutrition Day on October 16, the Tecnológico de Monterrey presented the Strategy Zero Hunger in order to collaborate with the strategic plan of Nuevo León 2030, who in turn collaborates with the campaign of the Secretary General of the UN which seeks to eradicate food poverty for 2030.

This strategy intends to eradicate extreme food poverty and reverse the current culture of food waste by 2030, through coordinated and innovative actions of the Tec community, Cáritas, the Government, the private sector, universities, the Church, the organizad civil society, the Board of Nuevo León, and the community in general.

In order to achieve their goal, ZERO HUNGER in Nuevo León is organized in nine committees, thirty-six projects, and ninety-six advisors, with the participation of students, professors, and collaborators of our institution, as well as our partners, through studies, collections, donations, awareness campaigns, food distribution, and management and consumption strategies, among others.

Processing Plant of the Food Bank of Cáritas in Monterrey

As part of the efforts derived from ZERO HUNGER, the Processing Plant of the Food Bank of Cáritas in Monterrey stands out, inaugurated in October 2018. The Tec community helps in several activities for the operation and streamlining of the plant.

The volunteers, with more than 100 professors and students, collect and handle food products, they have designed over 365 new items to extend their shelf life, and they are implementing certifications to guarantee that the articles donated are handled properly.

Each year, 20.4 million tons of food are wasted in Mexico, therefore the goal of this initiative is to increase the annual collection from 4,566 tons to 30,000 tons, in order to eradicate hunger in Nuevo León.

Additionally, the intention is to replicate the initiative and to create value propositions to coordinate efforts and streamline processes with a network of food banks in all the country, to help combat food waste and eradicate hunger in every state.

Avoid contaminating: do not waste food!

The goal of this academic challenge is to develop an awareness campaign about food waste in Mexico.

The campaign was carried out as part of Semana i (i Week) with the participation of students of different undergraduate programs, who, from an innovation and social entrepreneurship perspective, made several proposals for awareness strategies about the food waste problems and how to tackle them.

Regarding social networks, the initiative was oriented to the collection of funds and to the promotion of action strategies to reach the largest number of people and states possible, as well as to avoid waste in restaurants, cafeterias, and households.

Additionally, it was connected to World Food Day (October 16th.) in order to promote the collection of bean seed among the students. The bean raised was donated to the BAMX Foundation (Food Banks) in Mexico).

The World Bank, Hilton Hotels, the CMR Group, The Food Bank in Mexico, Bank of America, The Food Bank in Egypt, and The Information Center of the United Nations for Mexico also participated in this project.





Medical attention at "Casa Hogar, N.L.", "DIF Capullo", Health Center "San Gilberto" and "Destellos de Luz"

Medical interns doing their social service in medicine go daily as consulting physicians to "Casa Hogar, N. L." (Children's Home in Monterrey, Juárez and Guadalupe), "DIF Capullos" (Guadalupe), Health Center "San Gilberto" (Santa Catarina) and Casanicolás Migrant House (Guadalupe).

The doctors treat common illnesses and afflictions in general such as colds, gastroenteritis, viral and bacterial infections of the upper respiratory tract; they also apply dressings, make simple sutures, vaccinate, among others.

At Destellos de Luz (San Pedro Garza García), the medical interns help in the ophthalmology area, doing clinical records, initial examinations, reviewing medical histories, and participating in information sessions of the ophthalmology service.



"Online tutor" - Prepanet Monterrey

This is an online High School from Tecnológico de Monterrey aimed at inhabitants of the metropolitan area in Monterrey and other municipalities of Nuevo León, who want to continue studying but cannot attend a traditional educational system due to different reasons.

Students from all the undergraduate programs of the Tec who are doing their social service, and who are highly sensitive to the sector they are assisting, participate as tutors in this initiative. Additionally, active faculty participate voluntarily as coordinators of a subject, endorsing and validating the courses academicallywise.

The educational model of Prepanet is fully integrated and, upon completion, the student is awarded the official certificate of high school. For graduates, this represents an opportunity of personal and professional growth which enables their social mobility.









Reforestation and care of natural resources

Allliance for Climate Action – Monterrey

The World Wildlife Fund (WWF) and Tec de Monterrey, as strategic partner, launched the Alliance for Climate Change in the metropolitan area of Monterrey (ACA-MTY) with the objective of reducing the impact of climate change, adapting to the needs that derive from it, and positioning the agenda of climate crisis in Nuevo León.

ACA-MTY is made up by 40 organizations and institutions, whose main goal is to achieve the collaboration of local governments, the private sector, scholars, and the civil society, in order to face the challenges of the global climate crisis.

Some of their commitments are:

- -Make the commitments of climate actions visible.
- -Improve and scale current climate actions and commitments.
- -Be consistent inside their institutions by implementing climate actions in their operation and day-to-day activities.
- -Form a common front to work jointly with the Federal Government, looking for different opportunities that will enable to increase the ambition of the commitments. established in the Paris Agreement, and direct public politics towards contributing to the climate actions of the ACA-MTY.
- -Circulate information that contributes to reinforce the environmental and climate action culture in Nuevo León. as well as to make those commitments visible.





Voice of the victims

This project is an initiative from the School of Social Sciences and Government whose objective is to meet three main goals:

1. Training

The intention is to have thirty-two workshops on oral litigation skills, in five campuses of Tec de Monterrey, for hundreds of law students, professors, public officials in the justice area, and practicing lawyers.

2. Strengthening

The goal is the implementation of legal clinics with assistance for victims in five campuses of Tecnológico de Monterrey (Chihuahua, Mexico City, Monterrey, Toluca and Puebla). Students trained in oral litigation competencies will be exposed to cases where the victims need defense within the Accusatory Penal System, model which resulted in the creation of the Legal Service Center (CESEJ in Spanish).

3. Disseminating

The goal is to disseminate the project and its results, through conferences, educational forums, and the media, in order to create awareness in the population and communicate the services offered.

This is a joint project between our institution and the counterpart division of Arizona State University, Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law Center for Law and Global Affairs.

Other external partners are Casa ANTHAUS, Civil Justice (Justicia Ciudadana) in Puebla, the Department of the United States through the Mérida initiative funding the project, additional to State Prosecution Services, the Supreme Court of Justice of the State of Mexico, and the Legal Counseling Office (Consejería Jurídica) in the same state.






